

# **Pretty Little Pots**

7. Paloma's Pot Finished size: 4 1/4" x 7 1/4"





## Requirements:

Background fabric: 6" x 8 1/2"

Wool: 3" x 3  $\frac{1}{2}$ " mauve, 3" x 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " purple, 2" x 2" violet, 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ " hot pink and 2" x 2" leaf

80 weight thread (or similar): neutral

Batting: 3" x 3"

Cotton for pot: 4" x 4"

Freezer paper

### **Cutting:**

- Cut out the background fabric 5 ¼" x 8 ¼".
  The block will be trimmed when finished to 4 ¾" x 7 ¼"
- 2. Cut out the pot (C) in cardboard and batting
- 3. Cut out the fabric for the pot allowing approx. 1/2" seam allowance around all edges.

#### Making:

#### **Little Pot**

#### As before


- 1. Place the batting onto the cardboard pot shape.
- 2. Place the fabric over the batting and glue to the underside of the cardboard. Try to fold the fabric over as tight as possible.
- 3. Press the fabric from the right side and then again from the underside. Allow to cool and then carefully remove the cardboard. (a cuticle stick is helpful for this)
- 4. Using the template as a guide for placement, pin the pot into position.
- 5. Stitch with small slip stitches to attach the pot to the background.

#### Flower, leaves and stem

- 1. Trace the patterns for the flowers (4 circles) onto freezer paper and cut out.
- 2. Cut out the wool using the freezer paper patterns.
- 3. Pin the smaller flower circle to the medium circle. Stitch them together with lots of colonial knots. If using felted wool, you might like to whip stitch the edge.
- 4. Stitch this circle to the next circle with a row of cross stitches. Add a row of colonial knots.
- 5. Stitch this flower to the largest circle with a row of whip stitch. Add a row of colonial knots around the outer edge.
- 6. Pin the completed flower to the background using the template as a guide for placement. Stitch with whip stitch.
- 7. Mark on the lines for the stem.
- 8. Stitch the stem with 2 rows of stem stitch.
- 9. Pin and stitch the leaves to the background with backstitch through the centre. Again, if using felted wool, you might like to whip stitch the edges.






Backstitch:
